By the time most of the money was due for the trip, only three people were committed.

The several weeks that followed was full of Satan trying to get me to cancel the trip. Nobody eared, right? Were we really going to make an impact? Was this all forced and just a waste of time? Could I even handle, let alone lead all this?

Not even two weeks before the trip, my doctor said I am "more than likely" bipolar. My last roommate from another church also had this condition, and he helped run a missions trip.

Want to know how that worked out? He collapsed, spent months in the hospital, and it took him years to recover. I was convinced this trip was going to kill me. I may as well have told everyone that the next Star Wars film was going to be an underwater noir love story filmed by some unknown director from Russia. There was simply no way this wasn't going to be a disaster.

Except, it wasn't.

Within the last week of the registration deadline, the number enrolled more than tripled and had paid their balances in full. We ended up with a big enough group to actually work in two places in Detroit. Satan became desperate and began to throw everything he

could into our plans, but our God was not having it. Not even some unexpected expenses or doing a last minute search for a different group vehicle dampened our spirits. The end result was full of laughs and brokenness, rededicated and new followers of Christ, and memories that will last forever.

A special thanks goes out to everyone who have participated in this trip, as well as the leaders and elders of Summit Christian for their support. We would also like to thank everyone else who provided us with supplies and other important things. The United Metropolitan Methodist Church and Motown Mission were very hospitable, and it was an honor and a privilege to work alongside them to help rebuild Detroit. Most importantly, none of this would have been possible without our Lord leading the way through.


















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The Metropolitan






the western half of the

members. The church is a very large structure in the English Gothic style, built from a distinctive ochre granite from Massachusetts. It is built in a traditional cruciform design buttressed with several low side wings and a gabled roof. The sanctuary occupies the

building while the eastern half contains an auditorium, offices and classrooms. A hallway on the main level separates the sanctuary from the auditorium. and can be retracted to allow seating for up to 7,000 with a view of the chancel. SOURCE: Wikipedia


